Eyes Without a Soul – Post Industrial Portraits, 2024 24 photographs, inkjet print on fine art paper, 50 x 37,5 cm each galleria fonti
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Eyes Without a Soul – **Post Industrial Portraits** is a series created inside Tres Xemeneies (Three Chimneys), a decommissioned thermal power station in Catalunya built in the 70s, leaving behind a legacy of industrial contamination. The toxic footprint of its past still lingers in the soil, a silent testament to the era of heavy industry.

Kia Henda wandered through the plant's decaying interior, reading the marks left by years of industrial activity. In this photographic essay, iron screws embedded in the reinforced concrete emerge as weary, hollow eyes, forming abstract yet eerily human faces. These spectral figures evoke a profound sense of emptiness, alienation, and dehumanization—symbols of technological obsolescence and the residue of a vanished industrial age.

The eyes in these portraits seem to express anguish and distress, yet they remain devoid of a soul. The power plant, once a hub of energy and motion, now stands as a monument to decay, its crumbling structure birthing distorted reflections of the human form. Here, the boundary between flesh and architecture dissolves, as if the individual has become just another remnant of an obsolete machine.

Kiluanji Kia Henda (1979, Luanda, Angola) explores history, geopolitics, war and the impact of colonialism. Angola lies at the epicentre of his research, as a place through which to reconnect distant points in space and time, in the interweaving of history and fiction, fact, documentary, narrative and humour. He was awarded the National Prize for Culture and Arts by the Ministry of Culture of Angola and selected among the 100 Leading Global Thinkers by the American magazine Foreign Politics. In 2017 he won the Frieze Artist Award.
